Marie and Pierre Curie



Today the presentation of our famous personality is going to have a different format. Just by looking at Melissa and Neal, dressed in the style of the beginning of the twentieth century, you can see that this is about a really strange couple ... husband and wife actually. Steven is sitting in a different place, and he is going to be the narrator.

Marie: "My name is Marie Sklodowska. My parents are of Polish, Catholic descent and they were both secondary school teachers in Warsaw, where I was born in 1867. I finished secondary school there and later I came to Paris, to take up scientific research."

Steven: "Is there anyone who does not know about the life of the distinguished woman who was also the object of the most moving gratitude from those who have benefited from her tireless work? The world knows her by the name of Madame Curie."

Marie: "In Paris I had a very difficult existence and full of hardship, without breaks or dinner hours. I taught languages I could speak Polish, Russian, German, English and French. Two years later, I graduated in Physics and Mathematics, then they gave me a scholarship. I will never forget how much I needed that money. That's why I later offered money to the same organization so it could help other talented young people with economic difficulties."

Pierre: "My name is Pierre Curie. I was born in Paris, in 1859. I was a physicist and Marie did me the honour of becoming my wife. We've been very happy, because we are not just joined by affection, but also by other goals which led us to dedicate ourselves to scientific research."

Marie: "Because, a scientist who discovered the phenomenon of radioactivity, asked me to study radiation emitted by uranium in my doctoral thesis. When I finished these studies my husband and I discovered and isolated a new element, which we called Polonium, as a tribute to my native country."


Steven: "Some months later the Curies discovered and isolated Radium. This discovery made them very famous. That night was unforgettable. Let's hear how it happened ..."

Melissa: "They bought some cigarettes and smoked them in secret, but they did not enjoy them as much as they hoped."


"I feel bad, I want to die," said his cousin.

"We would prefer to stay here, these benches are comfortable ..." responded Mr. King, surprised.

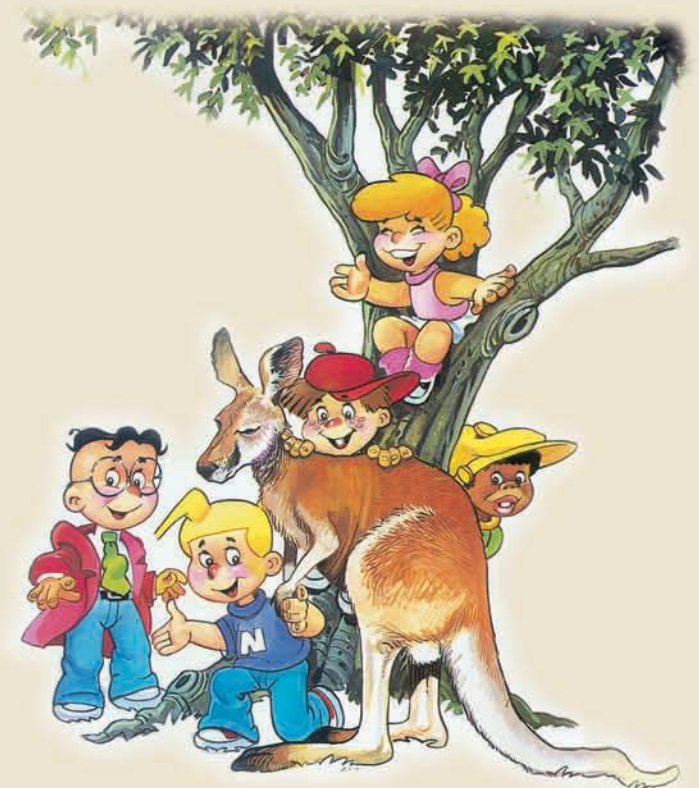
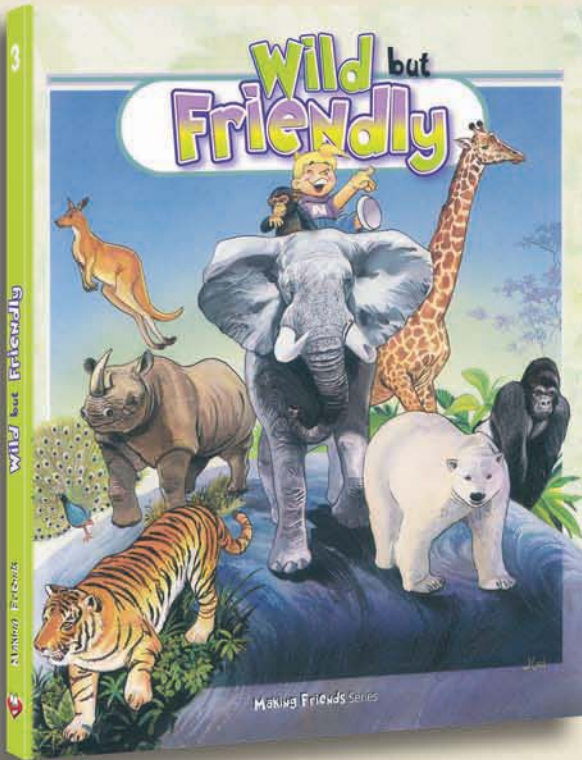
"We don't serve coloured people here in the entrance, you have to go to the back of the shop."

"Then we don't want to be served."

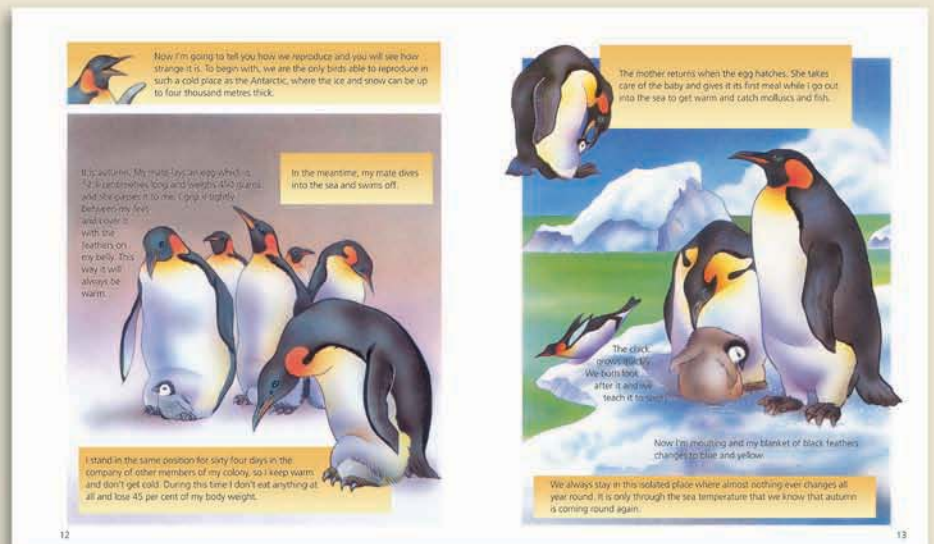
"We haven't done anything bad to anyone, we are decent people," explained the father to his son when they left the shop, trying to console him for not having bought the shoes that he wanted so much.

Bears

The biggest bears live in the pine forests on the west coast of North America. They can grow as tall as three metres and weigh nearly 700 kilos.

These animals are strong, fast, and dangerous. They swim very well. The mother bear gives birth (has her young) in winter, in the cave or den where they hibernate. When they are born, two or three in each litter, bear cubs are much smaller than a human baby. When they come into the world they are blind, toothless and have very little fur.

At one month old, the cubs venture into the woods on their mother's back or shoulders, and there she teaches them how to hunt.

First they eat fruit and look under stones in search of insects. They have to learn to swim, so their mother takes them to a place where the water isn't too deep and they will not drown, and they learn to fish.

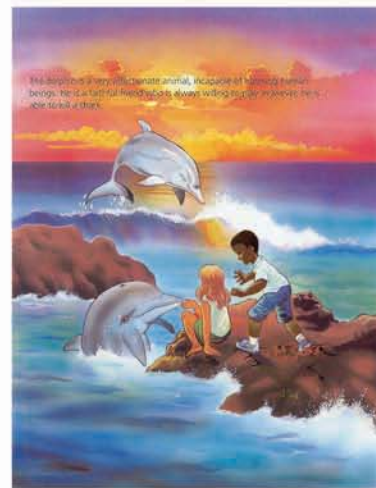
Knowing and making friends with them are the same thing ... and it also helps us to become aware of the respect due to them and to the environment that shelters them.

The dolphin is definitely a strange animal. He has attitudes which are very similar to those seen in humans and they are really surprising.

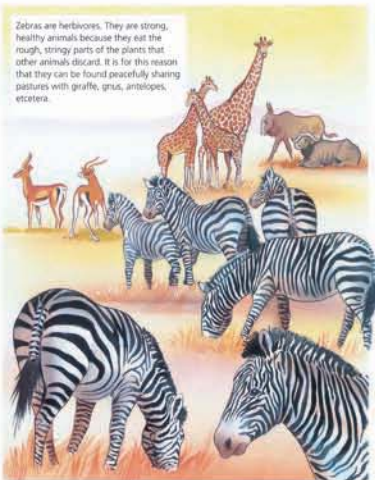
The dolphin is a very affectionate animal, incapable of harming human beings. He is a faithful friend who is always willing to play. However, he is able to kill a shark.



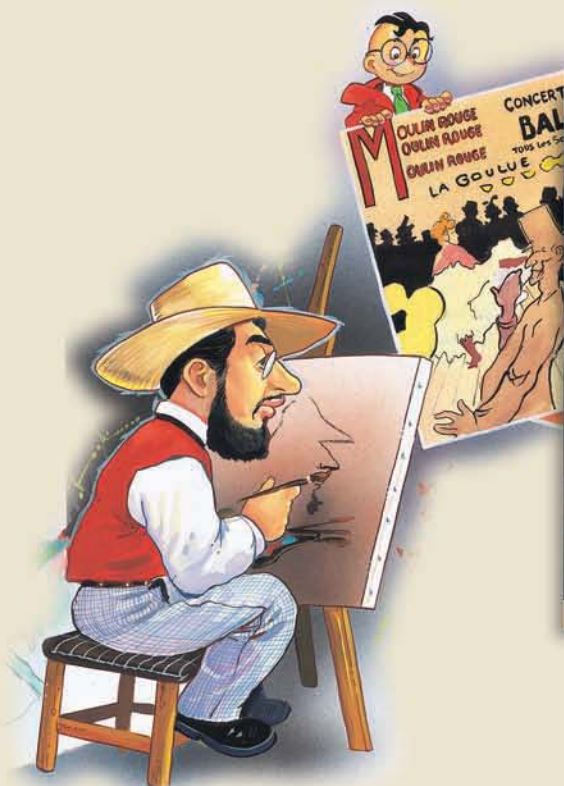
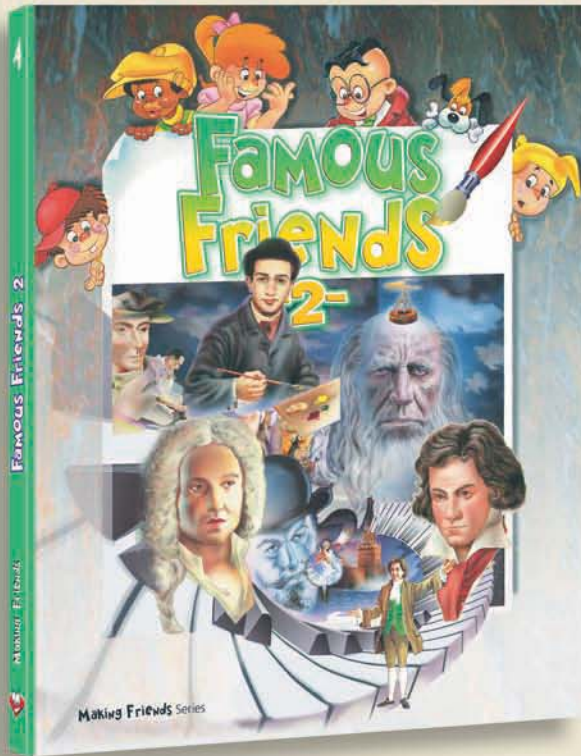
The Zebra

"Angola, 1999. The bang of an exploding mine can be heard. A doctor in his white coat leans over Nelson, who can't move because the mine has ripped his leg to pieces.


"Hello, little one. Are you awake? We've come to help you. You'll see how afterwards, you'll be able to walk as well like you did before. The worst is over.

Then a nurse appeared with a red cross on her chest and another on her head."

This is how Steven had started his presentation of his work on the Red Cross.

"But, who are these people?" asked Niall.

Steven continued: "For you to understand what I'm talking to you about, we have to go back more than a hundred years, to the bloody military victory of the Italian and French soldiers over the Austrians in Solferino (Italy) in 1859. Nearly three hundred thousand men were involved in the fight and, in only twelve hours, almost forty thousand were killed or seriously injured. When the battle ended, the area was covered with wounded men and dead bodies.





Nobody treated them, there were no medicines or food, and water was scarce. At the end of the battle each nation thought only about their wounded, abandoning the enemies taken in the battlefield, some dead and others dying. Blood flooded the ground and groans filled the air.

Henry Dunant, a rich Swiss merchant who had moved to Italy for business reasons, happened to find himself in the middle of this battle.

On witnessing the suffering of the injured men, abandoned to a horrible death, he felt very sorry for them. He couldn't bear to look at these scenes without doing anything. He organized rescue patrols with the help of the inhabitants of the region, and he felt that he had to inform people about these horrors.


"Fortunately my cat survived," said Ricky, still shocked.

"What did they discover?" asked Melissa.


"The examinations showed that the parental lobes of his brain were 15% bigger than normal."

"Well, you would have thought that he was a gifted child, but it's not true. He was born into a Jewish family on 14th March 1879, in Germany. He was very shy and he was slow to speak, almost four years old. His parents and teachers started to think that he was a mentally retarded person. He spent his childhood in Munich, but his family moved to Milan (Italy) when he was 10 years old. In 1889 he went to the Polytechnic School of Zurich (Switzerland) to study physics and mathematics. He finished his doctorate in 1901, and went to work in the Patent Department in Bern. The six years that he spent there allowed him to think about science and philosophy which later came to reveal his genius. This was when he published important studies about the theory of light and relativity.

In 1901 he started to lecture in universities, such as those in Zurich, Prague and Berlin. He was very sensitive to social problems and for this reason he travelled all over the world to defend causes such as world peace and Zionism in favour of the state of Israel.

He's a short man, who looks like a tramp, baggy trousers, flexible cane in his hand, moustache and he walks like a duck. ..."


"The Little Tramp!" they chorused.

"And what can you tell me about his childhood? I'd love to know!" asked Ricky.

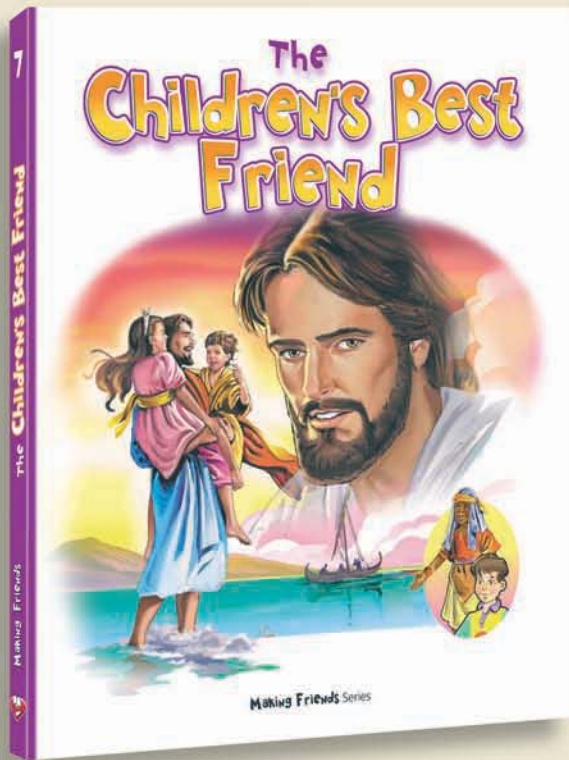
Niall replied: "He was born in London on 16th April 1889. His parents were poor artists.

He spent his childhood in squalid rooms in poor areas and in orphanages."

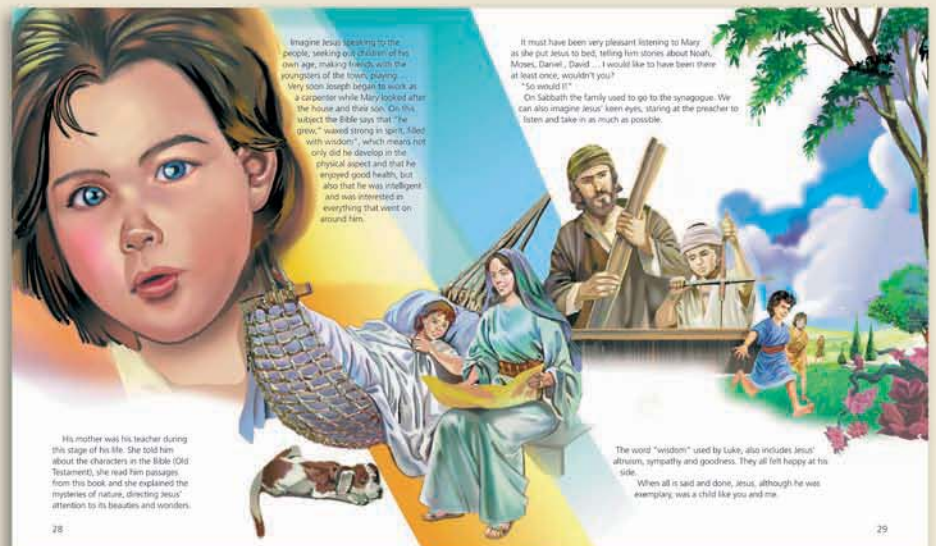
All this must have affected him," Leo commented, compassionately.

The women sorrowfully began to take their children and slowly move away.

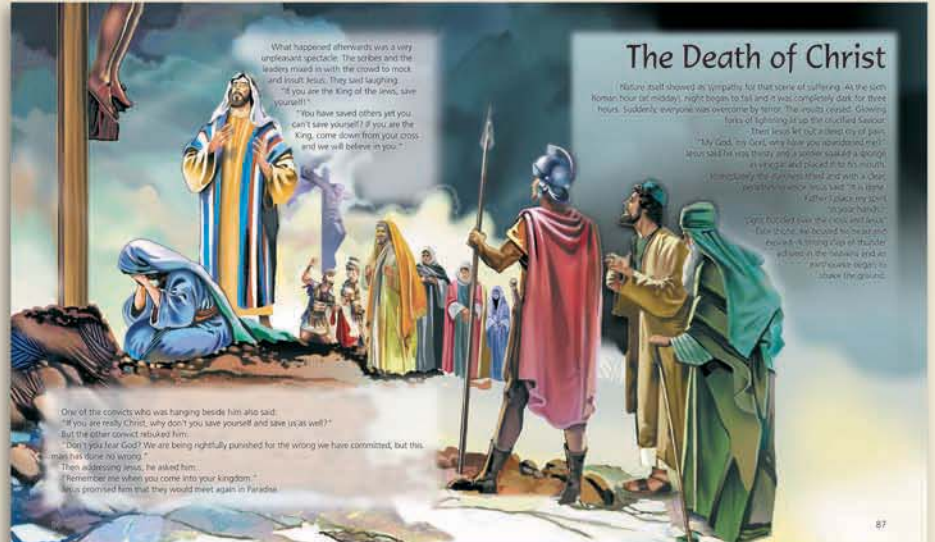
When he realised what was happening, Jesus asked them to stay and called his disciples.
